Thirty-five years ago, while a young Marine Corps officer, Frederick Frese, Ph.D. was diagnosed with schizophrenia, and over the next ten years was in and out of mental hospitals, often on secure wards. Despite his disability, he earned a degree in International Business Management from the American Graduate School of International Management in Phoenix, as well as Masters and Doctoral degrees in psychology from Ohio University. Prior to his current appointments, Dr. Frese served for fifteen years as Director of Psychology at Western Reserve Psychiatric Hospital, one of Ohio's largest psychiatric hospitals. He has served as a long-time activist on behalf of persons suffering from serious mental illness on the local, state, and national level, and within such organizations as the American Psychological Association, the National Institute of Mental Health, the Veterans Administration, and the National Alliance for the Mentally Ill (NAMI).
